# **SUPERINTENDENT NEWS –Mr. Carlstrom:**

A school year observes different "seasons". We have moved from summer to fall and winter will be here soon. The fall sports season will turn in to winter sports season. The first quarter of school is now behind us and we will soon be ready for the next testing season.

Our school does four major assessment (testing) seasons. We do a fall MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) assessment when school first starts. We will do a winter MAP assessment of students in December and the testing season ends with a spring MAP assessment. The results of these tests are almost immediately known and can be shared with staff, parents and students. The goal is to use the results to find what we need to concentrate on teaching and learning. We use the spring MAP assessment to check for meeting our academic improvement goal of 80% of students being at grade level. I left one season out. We also have the NeSA testing season. NeSA stands for Nebraska State Assessments and they are used to measure how well our students do in meeting the state standards. We are preparing recognition for last year's Juniors who had the best school average of having 58% of the students meet the state standards in the NeSA science test. We hope to inspire other classes to try and beat that. Nothing wrong with some friendly competition.

Taking tests is probably something most people do not get excited about. But, we need our students to do the best they can, every time they are challenged. We are constantly looking for ways to motivate students to do the

> best they can on assessments. We all need to express how important they are.

> Thanksgiving time will soon be here. Before we get to that recognition, I would like to give a big THANKS to our veterans. My son proudly served in the Air Force for six years and I never really thought about the sacrifice veterans make for us until it directly involved me. He missed every holiday with us. 
# **After School Program**






# Speech and Language—Mrs. Kanaly

# Vocabularu

Receptive Language:

abults simply, this is the information that we "receive" From petiters. We can determine how much a shild is "receiving" by how well they can follow directions, anomor questions, etc

Expressive Language:

Basically, how you express yourself to others. We tend to think of "language" as the "words" we use, but this can also include non-verbal means of communication.

This can include gestures (like pointing and waving), body language (like turning away from someone to end a conversation), and facial expressions. Just as vital as "verbal communication." this is and agreet of language that is difficult for many children to group (particularly students on the Autism Spectrum, Students with ADHD, and students with Non-Verbal Learning Disphility).

Praamatics: The social aspects of language. This deals with those "hidden

miles" that just about everyone seems to know - you respond when someone greets you, you add to conversations with a comment on the same (or similar) topic, you don't insult the person with whom you are speaking. This is another aspect of language that is particularly difficult for students on the Antism Spectrum and other disabilities

SYNTAXI This has to do with the neles that youern how we organize words into sentences.

Semantics Refers to the meaning of a message.

Morphemes: Words (and parts at words) that carry meaning. For example, "yown" indicates something you do when you're fired [I marpheme], "yowned" indicates [I] what you do, and [2] when you

) A V g o v.: Consonant-vowel sequences that minic the inconation patterns of adult speech, but do not consist of true words. I often hear parents refer to this as "globerish."

Fluency:

The mythm and flow of speech. A disruption in that flow (dysfluency) is commonly known as stuffeling.

How you say the sounds within the words. A child with Articulation on arliculation delay/disorder has difficulty producing one or some sounds.

An internal classification system for sounds. When a child has a phonological problem, they have difficulty with entire classes of sounds (e.g., sounds made from the back of the mouth or sounds made with prolonged air-flow). Their errors fall into "patterns" called "phonological processes." A child with a phonological disorder is generally more difficult to understand than a child with an articulation disorder.

Take some time to talk to your students about their futures no matter their age!


